Affordability: Financial costs for services

<u>Availability</u>: Available services to meet the volume and needs in a community (supply and demand)

Accessibility: Services are within reasonable proximity (location)

<u>Accommodation</u>: Providers are available when you need them (do they have appointments available beyond regular business weekday hours?)


Acceptability/culturally appropriate: Provider/service address cultural concerns

Prescriber Profession Type By Race/Ethnicity (ACGME, 2019)










ROTA Rural Opioid Technical Assistance Program




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Rural Emergency Medical Services Training- EMS Training

SAMHSA recognizes the great need for emergency services in rural areas and the critical role EMS personnel serve across the country.




Evidence-based Practices Resource Center (EBPRC)

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Minority Fellowship Program (MFP) and Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU)

Minority Fellowship Programs (MFP)

- The MFP seeks to train and better prepare behavioral health practitioners to more effectively treat and serve people of different cultural and ethnic backgrounds
- MFP fellowships are open to people pursuing master's or doctoral degrees in various fields of behavioral health through <u>seven national behavioral health organizations</u> selected by Congress to administer the program
- Approximately 200 MFP fellows are awarded educational scholarships and receive training each year under the program

Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Center for Excellence in Behavioral Health

• The purpose of this program is to recruit students to careers in the behavioral health field to address mental and substance use disorders, provide training that can lead to careers in the behavioral health field, and/or prepare students for obtaining advanced degrees in the behavioral health field

97% SUCCESS RATE: 100 LATINO STUDENTS HAVE GRADUATED FROM COLLEGE WITH A BEHAVIORAL HEALTH DEGREE AND ARE WORKING IN THE FIELD OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH.
